



#### 2020 - 2021 LEADERSHIP REPORT

#### Governance

It is my honour on behalf of the Committee of Governance (CoG) to present the 2020-2021 Annual Report on the activities of Sussex Neighbourhood House Inc (SNH). In doing so, there's no escaping the issues that have over-shadowed all else for the past 18 months - the Covid-19 pandemic, and its consequences. These years and beyond will be remembered as a period of the most unsettled and difficult years in our experience and working through these difficult times has brought one significant outcome for us, the acceleration of the shift to digital.

In response to the Covid-19 virus overtaking our community in 2019 we acted quickly to meet the challenges that faced us, and since then we have continued to update and follow through on our Covid-19Safe, and Business Continuity Plans. Swift action by our Federal and State Governments to introduce financial assistance cushioned the initial shock for us. We were able to offer a working from allowances to staff, who adapted well to working from home (albeit frustrating at times). With the tremendous support of staff, tutors, and volunteers we were able to continue to "keep our doors open virtually". The acceleration of the shift to digital helped us continue to present many of our programs and activities online, also attend all meetings via video conferencing.

Nothing says more about our staff's commitment than the way they have continued to handle the workload to keep us operating; ensuring our community could continue accessing our services. I would like to sincerely thank all of our CoG and House Members, Staff, Tutors, and Volunteers for their selflessness in being there throughout the continued tough times.

Apart from managing the Covid-19 pandemic, the committees' priorities for the year consisted of, welcoming and settling in three new members to our committee, improving communication with the installation of new financial, office, administrative and bookings software, reviewing programs to a virtual capability, and reviewing policies and maintenance/security protocols. We met all compliance obligations to all levels of government, and prepared submissions for government grants. Our thanks to government for ample financial and business partnership support allowing for a sound financial position, as set out in this report.

As Mr John Watson has completed three terms as our Treasurer, this will be his last report, so we take this opportunity to thank him for six years of diligent service to the House, and wish him well in his future endeavours.

And through it all, the Mission Statement of the SNH has remained our focal point, which is to provide a relevant hub that Supports, Engages, Connects, and Excites our community through lifelong learning, social activities and by responding to community needs.

We are pleased to report that on 4th May 2021 we welcomed Mr Joe Cassar to the position of General Manager of Sussex NH, taking the place of Mr Vic Issell who retired in October 2020. It was a lengthy journey to find a new manager, and Joe was an outstanding candidate. He's had many years' experience working closely with community, directly contributing with hands on experience in service management, planning and organisational development, people and relationship management, volunteer leadership, policy and systems development, and experience in financial management. We would also like to thank Ms Elizabeth Cleland who undertook an Interim Management role, filling the gap between managers. Her expertise and support was greatly valued.

The very best thing to lift our spirits and give us much joy this year, is the celebration of our 30th Anniversary in August. For all of those years, we have been supporting and serving our community as one of Moreland City Council's seven neighbourhood houses. Not all of us have been with the House for the 30 years, but those who have, we know that they, along with current supporters have loved every year of those 30. We appreciate your involvement in getting us to where we are today. We have shared 30 instalments of memories of those years on Facebook. And we have celebrations planned for later this year, for you to join us in reminiscing over all of the wonderful years.

We look forward to the coming year and our continuing community involvement. We are mindful that we have a challenge in keeping our organisation strong, and it's clear that the Covid-19 pandemic will be with us for the foreseeable future. With your support and the incorporation of short and longer-term strategies we will endeavour to incorporate what we have learnt over the past two years, and are optimistic that we will rise to the challenges as we progress in creating our 2022-2025 Strategic Plan. It will be a privilege to have you join us on the future journey of SNH.

#### 2020 - 2021 LEADERSHIP REPORT

#### Operations

The achievements of the Sussex Neighbourhood Neighbourhood House (SNH) over the last 12 months have been truly remarkable. SNH has continued to support the Pascoe Vale community during a time of significant disruption and change.

As the new manager I would firstly like to acknowledge the management baton passed on from Liz and Vic. Vic, it must be said has left strong foundations in place with healthy relationships – participants and community partners alike. The move to the Moreland City Council purpose-built facility at the Pascoe Vale Community Centre has been a game changer and sets the House up beautifully for the future. Liz has done an amazing job whilst the centre was predominantly in and out of lock down, in not only competently 'holding the fort' but in developing a raft of internal business improvements. Her ongoing mentorship and support to SNH in all things related to the business and local community has been invaluable.

Whilst maintaining services has been the primary focus of the House, the auspice leading to the development and establishment of the Pascoe Vale Food Collective truly warrants recognition and our admiration. Their contribution to sustainable and ethical local wholesome food supply fulfils an identified local need and has been embraced enthusiastically by the local community.

Also of note was the establishment of the Homework Club – providing tutoring in the first instance to students from the Pascoe Vale Girls High School. The Homework Club has already proven itself to be popular across other local high schools and is expanding into VCE school holiday intensives and VCE exam support preparation.

The social demographics of Pascoe Vale are changing noticeably, with an increased population of younger families and youth living in the area. With an eye to the future our role is to remain relevant and responsive to current community needs and desires.

#### **TREASURER'S REPORT**

With the House's activities decreasing, one would expect that the turnover would reflect that. However, the turnover of the House was virtually the same. In fact, only a modest \$265 increase to \$598,711. This was due to an increase in Local, State and Federal Government Subsidies and Grants which covered the decrease in Facility Hire and Service Fees for Programs.

Our operating expenses increased due to an increase in award rates for wages, change in programs with a range of new sub-contracted tutors, pay-out to the former House Manager, engagement of an Interim Manager longer than planned, additional cleaning requirements after non-occupation of the facility during COVID restrictions, review of computer capacity and capabilities and some additional administration costs. Total expenses were \$539,804 with a Net Operating Surplus of \$58,907.

Our bank accounts remain quite healthy with an increase of 50.8% over the previous year and covers our liabilities by 3.08% compared to 2.85% the previous years.

Several of the state government grants were not assigned to specific expenditure. Some of these monies have been used in the computer review. The review found that the computers memories were nearly full, software licences were out-of-date and were old versions of newer more modern software. It was decided to use the grants to replace monitors, upgrade the software, purchase new laptops and personal computers with an upgrade in WIFI access. The expenditure will all be shown in the 2022 financial reports. The COG also agreed to the purchase a new photocopier/scanner/fax machine which will negate the necessity to outsource of future program leaflets.

I leave the House in a healthy positive position from when I first became Treasurer just over 6 years ago.

I thank all current and past members of COG for their co-operation in these difficult times in which we are living. I thank our bookkeeper for carrying out the weekly duties making my duties easier. I thank the previous House Managers for their inputs into my role. I now go into the back stalls to mentor the new Treasurer for several months. The 2022 financial reports will be fully produced in the Zero accounting software which has been implemented since July this year.

I wish everyone the best of luck for the future.

#### ACFE (Adult Community Further Education) Program Report

Delivering ACFE programs in 2020 – 2021 through Covid 19 related restrictions, proved to be challenging. All of Term 3 and part of Term 4 was in lockdown with students where possible attending via videoconferencing and home workbooks. Online learning however did not always suit everyone. We found for example that:

- People with low levels of English found it difficult to engage online as literacy is linked to many online tasks.
- Not all students have access to digital devices and the data required.
- Parents with school aged children had their hands full with home schooling.

Our dedicated tutors, Dinusha & Asha, adapted their teaching methods and managed to keep students engaged with their learning. Our English as an additional Language (EAL) students displayed resilience and a strong commitment to learning. We were also extremely pleased that Tim & Anna were able to engage new students to the organisation via online learning with 'Excel' and 'Get to the point' (writing and CV development).

Asha and Dinusha participated in ACFE supported personal development training in the Adult Literacy and Numeracy Practitioners Program and gained a lot from the opportunity. Louise, the coordinator, participated in the free ACFE Outreach, Pathways and Marketing training.

We didn't manage to deliver all our contracted student hours in 2020. We were however very appreciative of the concessions made by the ACFE Board in recognising the difficulties in delivering programs by releasing all 2020 payments.

We moved into 2021 with much enthusiasm for the new year and no sign of lockdown, with students invited back to face to face classes in the house. Our delivery plan was improved and aligned more closely with the 2020 – 2025 ACFE strategic plan. In Term 2, we ran a new program 'Career Planning' with OCTEC, a disability employment provider referring a good number of their clients to the program. We also began discussions with MAX Employment a disability employment provider on possible program partnership opportunities.

### **PASCOE VALE FOOD COLLECTIVE**

The idea for a Food Co-op or Collective in Pascoe Vale started in late 2019 and was mainly driven due to a lack of wholesome food supply in the Pascoe Vale area especially via sustainable and ethical means. It was identified that there was no supermarket in Pascoe Vale and with food insecurity in the area making it difficult for residents to purchase local, ethical and package-free non-perishable food and cleaning products. The idea also included a vision where the community could meet in a welcoming space and volunteers and members could help and support and form new friendships.

Following some initial conversations and huge support from the Sussex Neighbourhood House, the Pascoe Vale Food Collective was established. Together we signed an Auspice agreement in June 2020. Shortly thereafter, Moreland Council offered a permanent small space in the Pascoe Vale Senior Citizens Centre for the storage of food, and this was to become our home. The Council also granted us a food licence.

A planning committee was established in July 2020 and we quickly took the opportunity to apply for a Council project grant and a smaller grant from the Inner North Community Foundation. The grants were so important to help us purchase equipment like scales and tablets, but more so, for the initial cost of purchasing the bulk food, and meant that we could start purchasing without concerns about fundraising or donations.

Throughout the rest of the 2020 year, the committee developed a Charter, outlining the roles and responsibilities of the committee, and continued to plan and fit-out our small space in the hall, ready and waiting to start. But it wouldn't be until March 2021 that the Collective would be able to have its first Distribution Day, and this was all due to the Covid19 pandemic and the many restrictions in place until that time. In March we celebrated the launch with a small celebration and speeches by Claire Martin and Liz Cleland, declaring the official opening of the Collective. We were very lucky with timing to be able to have a Makers Market on the day to support some local businesses. And we all can't forget the beautiful music and singing by a local duo on the day.

Since that day, the Collective has continued to be an essential service to the community and holding distribution days on the second Saturday of each month. We operate as an essential service in accordance with a strict Covid Safe Plan – and the ongoing pandemic has highlighted how critical food security is to a community like ours.

The PVFC is accepting of anyone in the community who wishes to join us on distribution days, although our preference is to recognize and acknowledge our members who support us through regular purchases and volunteering efforts. Our membership base for the period ending June 2021 was 34 and this continues to grow.

## **PASCOE VALE FOOD COLLECTIVE**

The PVFC stocks 64 items including flours, rice, pastas, nuts, seeds, vinegars, oil, honey, coffee, spices, and some washing and cleaning products. Where possible we source as local and ethical as possible, trying to minimize excessive food miles and excessive packaging, and ensuring that growers are reasonably paid for their work. Members and casual visitors are able to bring their own containers to be filled with as much or as little as they need. Packaging is minimized and the Collective ensures responsible re-use or recycling of the packaging we receive. Our supplier of cleaning products will collect empty buckets from us to be re-filled again.

Our sales each month have progressively increased, as has the volume of shoppers on each day. Up until June 2021 we sold \$2764 worth of products and collected \$897 in membership fees. For the same period we outlaid \$4880 to purchase products. Our bank balance on 30 June was \$3595.

It has been an exciting year, meeting members and sharing our values relating to care for the earth through a practical approach to reducing consumption of packaged goods. Strengthening connections with the broader community around our shared values is encouraging.

We look forward to the continuing success of the Collective and have ambitious plans to expand in the future.

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# Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2021.

The financial statements cover Sussex Neighbourhood House Inc as an individual entity. Sussex Neighbourhood House Inc is a not-for-profit association incorporated in Victoria under the Associations Incorporated Reforms Act 2012 ("The Act").

The principal activity of the association for the year ended 30 June 2021 is providing community services.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

#### 1. Basis of preparation

In there opinion of the Committee of Governance, the association is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial statements who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. These special purpose financial statements have been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the Act.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards and Accounting Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 107 Statements of Cash Flows and AASB 108 Accounting Policies.

Significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs methods modified, where applicable by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets and liabilities.

#### 2. Income Tax.

The association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act of 1997 as amended,

#### 3. Summary of significant accounting policies

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably. It is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Association and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue, as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

Interest is recognized using the effective interest method.

Revenue in relation to rendering of services is recognized depending on whether the outcome of the services can be estimated reliably. If the outcome can be estimated then the stage of completion of the services is used to determine the appropriate level of revenue to be recognised in the period.

If the outcome cannot be reliably estimated then revenue is recognized to the extent of expenses that are recoverable.

Revenue from training services is generally recognized once the training has been delivered.

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand, demand deposits and short term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are ' subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Each class of plant & equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment

Plant and equipment is depreciated on a diminishing method over the useful life to the Association, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected when the liability is settled.

Employee benefits expected to be settled more than one year after the end of the reporting period have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In deterring the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may satisfy vesting requirements. Cash flows are discounted using market yields on high quality corporate bonds incorporating bonds rated AAA or AA by credit agencies, with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cash flows. Changes in the measurement of the liability are recognized in profit or loss.
